CANSAT Science Project

Euan McDonnell, Ronan Murphy, Patrizia Spiess and Deborah Fakeye are taking part in CanSats Europe Competition which is sponsored by the European Space Education Resource Office (ESERO). As part of the primary phase of the project, they will build a device that measures temperature and atmospheric pressure when dropped from a height of 300 feet. The device consists of an Arduino Circuit Board contained

inside a 330ml drinks can. The secondary mission is to measure methane levels in the atmosphere, using a methane sensor.

The group worked on the project for about two months and on the 15th of March took part in the Regional Finals at the Engineering Building at the AIT, against 5 other schools. The day seemed perfect for launching a quadcopter, with sunny

skies and warm weather. They also gave a presentation of their project to four judges, who questioned them thoroughly. As the day came to end, they were ecstatic to find out they were the winning team and would be progressing on to the National Finals in Emo Court in Portlaoise on the 27th of April. Well done!
