## GAISCE VENTURE

On Friday the 7th of September, students from Fifth and Sixth Year completed the final component of their President's Award by participating in a venture organised by Birr Outdoor Education Centre in conjunction with Josephine Meehan, President Award Leader. The trip entailed staying overnight at the Centre and taking on the challenging hike in the Slieve Bloom mountains. Bronze students were required to do a 25 km hike over 2 days, while those doing silver completed a 50 km hike over 3 days in compliance with the rules of the Gaisce Award.
This time away from school was an opportunity for students to be with others, friends and acquaintances and to develop skills such as teamwork, organisation and leadership. Students used the evenings to participate in team activities led by the outdoor education team leaders. We are very grateful to all the staff at BOEC for their support and hospitality.

## Geography Field Trip

Leaving Certificate Geography students are currently researching fluvial processes as part of their project work which is worth $20 \%$ of their final exam result. As part of this, students ventured on a fieldtrip to the Breensford River on Thursday 27th September to collect data and study the fluvial processes at work. Given that this river features a meander, students had to collect data to prove it is indeed a meander and that it is shaped by fluvial processes such as erosion, transportation and deposition. This involved calculating the river velocity, measuring the width and depth and completing an extensive bedload analysis. Students are now working on synthesising this data and compiling a report that will detail the geographical and fluvial findings of the outing.
